Dear Fellow Companions of the Way,

Mark 12:38-44 is the familiar story of the "widow's mite." Most of us remember the generosity of this woman, who having little gave a great gift. Jesus says she gave everything she had, a thinly veiled reference to the sacrifice he would make on the cross. This Sunday (November 8th), when we offer our stewardship pledges, we revisit the story of the widow's offering. The story itself has two parts, the first being the contributions of those who were rich and were dropping large sums of money into the temple treasury. It was to these gifts that Jesus compared the widow's two copper coins.

There is no getting around the fact that leading contributors each year help the church's ministry immensely with their financial gifts. We count on the generosity of those who are able to give significant gifts. But we count also on the hope that **everyone** will contribute a proportion of his or her means, which makes the actual dollar amount of each gift relative. In this way of considering things, the \$3,000 pledge from a person whose income is \$75,000 annually is not the same as that of the person who gives \$3,000, but whose income is \$30,000. The latter is not only proportional; it is sacrificial.

No one can tell you what your pledge to the Church should be. That is a matter between God and you. What we can do **together** is remember the sacrificial way in which the widow who Jesus praised gave, and do the same. Prayerfully consider the many blessings God has showered on your life as you make your pledge for 2016. Then give as you have received. That is all God asks us to do, and what Jesus asks of his disciples.

International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church

Millions of Christians around the world will unite in an annual day of prayer this Sunday (the second Sunday in November) for the persecuted Church, remembering Christians experiencing persecution, who couple their experience with thankfulness to God for "the privilege of suffering for his name's sake." As Christians living in America, we can often feel sorry for believers in other countries who are not as "well off" as we are in the West. But the founder of one organization that partners with the North Korean underground church says it is the American church, not the North Korean church, for which North Koreans pray with concern.

In a media release, Eric Foley, CEO of Seoul USA, says he was surprised when he first asked members of the North Korean underground church how Americans could pray for them. "They answered, 'You pray for us? We pray for you!' When asked why, they responded, 'Because Western Christians often put so much faith in their prosperity and political freedoms that they don't know what is like to have to depend completely on God. And because of that, they do not get to know him in all the ways he invites us."

Foley's hope is that Americans would not pray for persecuted Christians but with them. Foley reports that "North Korean believers always tell me not to pray that they would be removed from persecution but that they would be

faithful to God in the midst of their situation, and that we be faithful to God in our situation, which is often the persecution of prosperity, that is, the ability to be insulated from suffering rather than taking up our cross daily."
