AN ADVENT REFLECTION

The last paragraph of the chapter titled "Of the Last Judgment" in the Westminster Confession of Faith (*Book of Confessions*, 6.182) reads:

As Christ would have us to be certainly persuaded that there shall be a day of judgment, both to deter all (people) from sin, and for the greater consolation of the godly in their adversity: so will he have that day unknown to all (people), that they may shake off all carnal security, and be always watchful, because they know not at what hour the Lord will come; and may be ever prepared to say, Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly. Amen.

In this season of Advent -- how prepared are we to meet the Lord? Do we truly believe in the concept of a Last Judgment and life in a world to come? The loss of a sense of another world toward which we travel as pilgrims through this life has impoverished the lives we lead. The loss of a grand vision of the City of God in which God's people have citizenship even in this life has left us little to live for, much less to die for. These losses, in turn, are a function of a human-centered religion that focuses not on God's plans for the world as revealed in Christ through Scripture, but on human plans for personal and social improvement.

A healthy otherworldly emphasis might not be such a bad thing for the church. Such a perspective, far from withdrawing our attention from the needs of the world, would provide the under girding and the resolve to be faithful partners with God in the unfolding drama of redemption in human history. History has a beginning - and it will have an end. The biblical promise is that God will bring to consummation that which God created.

When you stop and think about it, if our vision is large enough, our perspective long enough, much of the struggle that consumes our lives can take on new meaning. With the Apostle Paul we can affirm:

So we do not lose heart. . .because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal (2 Corinthians 4:16-18).

"Do not lose heart" - place your lives in the hands of the God who made and sustains all and whose Son reigns. With confidence and hope we pray each day - not just during Advent - "Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly."

Thank you to the faithful who contribute generously to the finances at First Presbyterian Church.

Unfortunately, as of November 1st, our 2015 budget was \$90,000 in the red. Last year at the same time the church budget was \$65,000 in the red.

Actions taken by the church Session in personnel changes this year will see an annual savings of \$90,000 from the 2014 budget to the 2016 budget.

Over the past several years, per member giving at First Presbyterian Church has been less than 2/3 of national average for Presbyterians.
