# Dear Fellow Companions of the Way,

Where do you find your deepest feelings of contentment? If someone asked you, "How does one become content?" what would you say? I have found the word "contentment" is mentioned seven times in Holy Scripture and six times have to do with money. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me. (*Philippians 4:11-13*)

As Paul's example shows, we can be content regardless of how much "stuff" we have. But how do we connect our contentment to life's circumstances? Paul had a faith-based perspective: "Since I know it is all for Christ's good, I am quite content with my weakness and with insults, hardships, persecutions and calamities." (2 Corinthians 12:10) Paul's perspective recognizes the ultimate reason for living is Christ. It is an uncomplicated way to live when everything comes back to living for Christ.

When we depend on favorable circumstances for our contentment, our perspective constantly changes and we may become unhappy when things do not go our way. When we depend on Jesus Christ for our contentment, we are secure because his perspective is always consistent. (Hebrews 13:8) You can rely on God to provide contentment. That is the model to which Paul points. As you have been given an inner spirit of transformation, you are able to commit to God the things you cannot do for yourself. The Holy Spirit gives you a burning desire to be a faithful steward of the gifts and possessions entrusted to you. Biblical contentment is an inner peace that accepts the sovereignty of God over all life, over your life.

Paul makes more observations about contentment. In *1 Timothy 6:8*, he suggests a bare-bones orientation: "And if we have food and covering, with these we shall be content." Paul goes on to counsel Timothy about what to say to people who base their contentedness on their wealth: "Tell those who are rich in this world not to be proud and not to trust in their money, which will soon be gone." (*1 Timothy 6:17*) Paul continues in that verse to focus back on an eternal source of contentment: "their trust should be in the living God, who richly gives us all we need for our enjoyment."

May I suggest a help to find continued contentment? When you first awake and just before you go to sleep, meditate on *I Chronicles 29:11-12*. The passage reads:

"Yours, O Lord, is the greatness and the power and the glory and the majesty and the splendor, for everything in heaven and earth is yours. Yours, O Lord is the kingdom; you are exalted as head over all. Wealth and honor come from you; you are the ruler of all things. In your hands are strength and power to exalt and give strength to all."
