Stewardship Thought

I read the following quote in another church's newsletter: "It seems that the Butterball Turkey Company had set up a telephone hot line to answer questions people might have. A woman called to inquire about whether or not she should cook a turkey that had been in the freezer for twenty-three years. The operator told her that it might be safe if it had been kept frozen for the entire time, however, the turkey would probably have no flavor at all, and they would not recommend eating it. The woman replied, "that's what I thought, I'll just give it to the church."

This may be somewhat an extreme example, but is that our attitude towards our gifts to the church? Do we give the church what is leftover or that which we can do without? We need to remind ourselves that the first Commandment calls us to put God first in our lives. We also see this in the life of Jesus whose prayer to God was "not my will, but your will be done."

Our inability to put God first when it comes to our money is probably our biggest obstacle to a full relationship with God in Christ. Jesus knew this. That is why he spoke on the issue of money more than any other single topic. Putting God first in our lives should be our priority. Will you carefully examine your giving and your attitude towards your money and possessions? Is it getting in the way of your relationship with your Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer?
