# CANADY'S CHRONICLE

"If I just could win the lottery, then my life would be so much better." How many times have we heard people say that? How many times have we said that ourselves, or at least had that thought?

According to Jesus, people who think this way are in trouble. That's the clear implication of the story in Luke about the rich man and Lazarus. We're in trouble if our love of money blinds us, as it most often does, to the people of the world for whom earthly resources are a scarce commodity. Contemporary Lazarus figures are everywhere—men, women, and children of every description, whose lives are daily agony because of insufficient means.

Jesus begins his parable of the rich man and Lazarus by highlighting the gap that exists between the two—the rich man lives in affluence, while just outside the gates the poor man sits, dogs licking the sores on his body. The rich man goes to bed each night having had his fill of food, while the poor man goes to bed hungry. To make matters worse, the rich man pays no attention whatsoever to the poor man's plight.

A story like this should give most of us pause because the truth of the matter is, in terms of relative affluence, we are the rich man. Therefore, we need to sit up and pay careful attention to what Jesus is telling us here.

For one thing, Jesus is telling us that God has a deep protective instinct for the poor. All through the Bible there are hundreds of references that clearly attest to this truth. And, of course, in the life and teaching of Jesus Christ we see this concern revealed to perfection. Jesus proclaims that God has a broken heart for the unfortunates of our world and that God identifies with them, so much so that our showing kindness to such folks is equal to showing kindness to Christ himself.

Most of us understand full well what we're being told in this story. The challenge is to take what we now know and translate it into actions whenever and wherever possible. We need to look around and see the many different faces of Lazarus that surround us. They are everywhere. We just need to open our eyes to see them.

May we take the Lord's word to heart and begin with renewed earnest: we are to care for the broken and beggarly of our world—not out of fear for our eternal well-being, but out of love for their earthly well-being.

# Report from special summer discernment group #3: CE Vision and Evaluation

Three special summer discernment groups were convened this summer, each with its own mandate. The first group's challenge was to determine the future of FPC's Taize worship services. The second group's challenge was to determine the short-term vision for FPC's college ministry. The third was assigned to re-think the vision and evaluation methods informing programming decisions for the Christian Education Committee. The following summary items resulted from the hard work of the following caring individuals: *Kili Wenburg, Stephanie Brader, Irina Belikova-Erickson, Will Locke, Kim Hermann, Kris Horton, Matt Fong, Chad Murrell, Kathy Duval, Kraig Lofquist, Brady Rhodes, and Nancy Grams.* <u>Please thank them for their work!</u>

• Vision statement was re-written from...

"The Christian Education Committee of First Presbyterian Church believes that our calling in Christ is to provide spiritual care and development of children, youth, and adults; to focus our energy on Christian nurture; and to create contagious communities in Christ.

> ...to "With the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the Christian Education Committee at First Presbyterian Church supports the church's mission by providing to children, youth, and adults opportunities for spiritual formation through continuous learning and practice."

• Group moved through a 3-step process in which they (1) identified "what ought to be" (i.e. what a successful CE ministry would look like); (2) observed "what is" (i.e. noticed where the current CE ministry is strong, weak, omitted, or overemphasized); (3) created a list of goals (and evaluation structures) to move the ministry from "what is" to "what ought to be."
