CANADY'S CHRONICLE

Each Sunday, there are three lectionary passages that I often read during our worship (at times maybe only two.) Each Sunday, one of those passages is used as the scripture on which the message is based. The problem is, there is good information in those passages not chosen, which we miss unless we go home and read them for ourselves.

Looking ahead for October 2, there are great words in the 137th Psalm that is part of the lectionary. I am hoping that you will take the time to read that passage for yourself, but I also want to speak about it in this chronicle:

The people of Israel fought in a battle against the Edomites and lost. At the end of that battle, the Edomites are quoted as saying, "Tear it down! Tear it down!" That is, tear down the temple in Jerusalem. And it was torn down, and many of the people of Israel were taken captive and taken to the land of Babylon. There, they lament about their situation and pray that in their captivity they not forget their homeland. When asked by their captors to sing a song of their homeland, they lament to God that such an activity is not possible in a foreign land. At the same time, they are praying that in their captivity they will not forget where they came from and the wonders of their blessed Jerusalem.

The power of the Psalms is that they show people of the ancient past as those who have the same feelings, hurts and pains as we do. In their sorrow for Jerusalem, the Israelites voice their deep anger against their captors: "O daughter Babylon, you devastator! Happy shall they be who pay you back what you have done to us! Happy shall they be who take your little ones and dash them against the rock!" Revenge is heavy upon their hearts, and they won't be satisfied until they can get even. The sense is that the good guys will win in the end by the enemy getting what is coming to them. Revenge can take many forms.

We live in a society that puts revenge and getting even at the top of our priorities. If someone harms us, then we won't feel good until we can harm them back (we call that war sometimes). But I am here to tell us that revenge is not the way of God. God is not in the business of getting even. Jesus calls us to love our enemies: "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, 'Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you,' so that you may be children of God in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the righteous and on the unrighteous."

As hard as those words are to follow, we do so because the ways of God are far better for our world than the ways of the world. We want to honor the words in Psalm 137, but we also want to measure them against the words of Jesus.
