## CANADY'S CHRONICLE

Just one more debate and that part of the presidential election will be over. What wonderful debates they were--or were they? What did they say? What did we learn? I for one did not learn anything about their positions on issues. All I heard was how bad the other candidate was. Neither one of the candidates let us know where they stood on the issues; they just threw mud at their opponent. More people watched the first two debates than in the past because we wanted to know where they stood. We had questions we wanted answered. Important questions about our future and the future of our country.

This reminds me of a question that was put to Jesus in Matthew's gospel, "Which is the greatest commandment?" The Pharisees and the Sadducees were plotting together on how to get Jesus to trap himself into saying something or doing something that would place him in violation of Hebrew law and get him arrested. Again, I am reminded of the debates. People watched because there were things we needed or at least wanted to know. For some I imagine their mind was made up as to who they would vote for. And yet there may be that one answer that would make certain their decision was correct.

Jesus also knew that he was being put to the test. He knew that the question was to place him in an awkward position. "If I say this commandment is the most important, then some will question why I didn't choose another commandment. No matter which one I chose, someone will question my answer." So Jesus gave them the answer that could not be offensive to anyone: "Love God above everything else," and "love your neighbor as yourself." We read these verses so often that in their familiarity they lose power. But these answers Jesus gave were not wimpy little sound bites about "God is love." These were life-and-death times for Jesus. Each question, each sparring with the religious political machine was a type of trap. The questions put to Jesus were intended to disarm and do harm.

In our presidential debates, accusations have been made about how bad the opponent is, which never gets to the heart of what matters. All we have been hearing are words--words of hate and slander. Jesus' response to the religious leaders stated the facts that words are not enough. Actions of love are what is needed. Love God. Love your neighbor as you love yourself. These are actions' words.

In the book, *The Prophet,* Kahil Gibran puts a twist to this idea: "When you love you should not say, 'God is in my heart' but rather, 'I am in the heart of God." To love God above everything else and to love my neighbor as I love myself is to exist within the heart of God. I think this is precisely what Jesus wanted for us - not to win a debate on religious practices, not to become the leader of a religious movement, but to touch people with the love of God.
