FROM PASTOR GREG

Mount of Beatitudes in Israel

Dear First Presbyterian Church Family:

Over the past few weeks in worship we have been studying the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus' famous words from chapters 5-7 of the Gospel of Matthew. On our trip to the Holy Land in October, we had the chance to visit the site where it is believed that Jesus shared this sermon. Our group read part of the Sermon on the Mount and then shared communion in a garden on the site; it was a powerful and moving experience.

Back here in Hastings, on Sunday, February 2, our youth reflected on the Beatitudes, the first 12 verses of the Sermon on the Mount. Their message was about what it means to be "blessed" in a worldly sense and what it means to be "blessed" as a disciple of Jesus Christ. They cleverly and poignantly contrasted the blessing of great shoe laces with the blessing of helping people in need. They



did a faithful job reminding us that our blessings are based in practicing our faith through living the values of compassion, justice, mercy, and love.

On Sunday, February 9, we continued our study of Jesus' words in the Sermon on the Mount, focusing on chapter 5, verses 14-16: "You are the light of the world... Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." Our call to be light in a world of darkness is a strong one. My prayer is that both individually and collectively, we can continue to shine light into the darkness.

As the Sermon on the Mount continues in Matthew, it becomes even more convicting. In chapter 5, verse 22, Jesus tells us that holding anger against someone makes us liable to judgment and then goes on to remind us that insulting and demeaning others is completely antithetical to the Christian faith and not acceptable behavior for the people of God.

Jesus continues in verses 38-39, "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, Do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also." Rather than hit back with equal or greater ferocity when we have been struck, as Christians, we are called to deescalate. This is not easy advice to follow, but Jesus couldn't be any clearer.

How are we supposed to treat our enemies? In addition to deescalating, Jesus offers us this challenge in verses 43-44, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." Of all of Jesus' words in the Sermon on the Mount, these may be the most challenging ones for me to follow. First of all, I would like to think that I don't have any enemies, but if I am being honest with myself, I probably do. Second, loving our enemies and praying for those who persecute us takes all the fruits of the spirit and then some: joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control, patience, strength, wisdom, courage, and a wellspring of compassion. Sometimes those values are hard to muster for people who have hurt me or hurt those I love. One way I do this is to remind myself that everyone I meet is made in the image of God. By looking at everyone, even my enemy, as a child of God, I can begin to embrace the words of Jesus.

No one ever said that following the commands of Jesus would be easy. But just imagine what the world would look like if everyone did. Let's start with ourselves as we seek to build a beloved community of Jesus followers. Then our light will shine in the darkness, and people will come to know God's love through us.





Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Emergency Cleanup Buckets

Supplies needed:

One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (If bucket has been used, clean well but do not use if it has held chemicals of any kind.)
Four scouring pads
Seven sponges, including one large
One scrub brush
Eighteen reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Handi Wipes or Easy Wipes)
One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
One 16-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
One 12-16 oz. bottle of household cleaner that can be mixed with water
(no spray bottles)
One package of 48-50 clothespins
Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
Five dust masks
Two pairs heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free, non- surgical)
One pair work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather
24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll and removed from carton
One 6-9 oz hottle of non-perceol insect repellent

All cleaning items must be new— all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packing tape.

Value: \$75

Processing Fee: \$3 per kit

*Do not enclose money inside the kits or shipping boxes.

Please bring the buckets to First Presbyterian Church of Hastings by March 22, 2020. They will be donated to the distribution center in Lincoln.
