FOOTWASHING

When you come forward for the foot washing, leave your shoes and socks behind, walk forward, and line up. The person in front of you will take a seat at one of the basins. Extend one foot and then the other over the basin (but not in the water) while the person who is washing pours water over your feet. The one who is washing will dry your feet with a towel. Hold and help support the person's foot over the basin of water. Pour the water slowly and prayerfully over one foot, then the other; dry the person's feet gently. You may wish to say, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news" (Isa. 52, Rom. 10).

As each person finishes, I will say "Lord, in your mercy," We will all respond: Hear our prayer. Answer us in the day of trouble, O God, so that we may lift up the cup of salvation in the presence of your people, giving thanks for all your goodness to us; through Jesus Christ our Savior.

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STRIPPING OF THE CHURCH

While the final hymn is sung, communion elements, linens, banners, and other symbols are removed from the sanctuary. The congregation is invited to think of Jesus, who, on the night of his betrayal, laid aside his woven tunic and tied a towel around his waist. He stripped for service. The Gospel tells us that later "they stripped him" for mockery and death. The act of stripping the church reflects the last few days of Jesus' life. It also stands for those from whom something or someone is being taken away. It stands for us and our journey with Christ on this Holy Week.



An Upper Room Did Our Lord 202 Prepare




Guitar chords do not correspond with keyboard harmony.

This text conveys well the paradox of despair and expectancy felt on Maundy Thursday. The somber repetition of "this night" here contrasts with and prepares for the joyful "this is the night" repeated in the *Exsultet*, the ancient Easter hymn at the lighting of the paschal candle.
