Mary Seiler's Memory of the Costa Rica Mission Trip

On June 3, 1997, a team from First Presbyterian Church departed on a mission to the rural community of Betania, outside of Upala, Costa Rica near the Nicaraguan border. Our task was to assist financially and physically in the construction of an additional classroom building for the local elementary school, and to build relationships with the local community. Rev. Cheryl Elfond led the team which included Frank and Ruby Reis, May and Ira Wierenga, Sharon Christofferson, Shirley Johnston, Don Goodrich and myself. Additional members were Donna Dixon (from our Presbytery) and Robin Wilcox, a college student who was majoring in Spanish.

In preparation for our work in a Latin American community, we read and discussed We Drink From Our Own Wells by Peruvian theologian Gustavo Gutiérrez The project in Costa Rica was organized with the local community by Presbyterian Mission Co-Workers, Gloria and Andrés Garcia. In Hastings, donations of school supplies, clothing and shoes for the children were collected and packed in our checked baggage. The team also assisted with the cost of supplies to complete the construction; when we arrived, only the pre-cast concrete walls were erected.

We knew we weren't in Nebraska anymore as we traveled by bus through Guanacaste province; the views out of our windows were trees laden with ripe mangoes and monkeys, and glimpses of volcanoes. Room and board was in a small local hotel in Upala, and we were transported from there to the work site each morning in a large van. Although a short distance, the trip took about 45 minutes on a rutted one-lane dirt road traveled mostly by people on foot, horseback, bicycle, an occasional motorcycle, and once, a team of oxen! We also had to cross a "bridge" consisting of two halves of a tree laid parallel across the river – no sides!

Each day at dawn, the crowing of roosters served as our alarm clock. We commuted to the school, working until we had to leave to get back to Upala before it got dark. Lunch was prepared at the construction site by the local women. The school kids and their younger siblings, curious and friendly, hung around us whenever they had

the chance. During breaks, we played Frisbee with the kids and learned about one another with Andrés, Gloria and Robin interpreting. We returned to Upala each evening to take a (cold) shower, and to relax with an evening meal, devotions, fellowship, and singing accompanied by Andrés on his guitar.

Several of us were invited by our new friends to visit their homes; these were typically simple one-room dwellings with a hard earthen floor, surrounded by a riot of bright blossoms, fruit trees, vegetable gardens, and chickens everywhere. I had the joy of riding horseback to the home of "William the chainsaw guy" who precisely cut all the lumber for raising the roof – without ever measuring! One of the more challenging jobs I remember was working in pairs or trios, using a heavy log as a pile driver to pound the rocks into the dirt floor of the new school room.

The final evening meal, prepared by the Betania community, was a holy communion of food, flowers, speeches, singing, tears of joy and gratitude, and a fond farewell. As we drove back to San José over the next couple of days, we were treated to an eruption of the Arenal volcano as we listened to the howler monkeys outside of our cabins, and the beautiful topiary creations in Zarcero, viewed through a magical mist cloud that often shrouds the gardens.

The contrast could not have been greater when the Garcias took us by bus to visit Pavas, a shantytown in San José located on a former city dump, where they help to serve a congregation. The extreme poverty of these most marginalized communities in Latin America is something that most of us had not witnessed before. Even though we had a meaningful week of working with an underserved community in Betania, this environment in the shantytown was upsetting to many of us. Later we met with the president of Seminario Biblico Latinoamericano, where we were staying in the dormitory. Preparing pastors and other church leaders from countries throughout Latin America to return to work in their own communities is the historic mission of the institution. Both Andrés (from Honduras) and Gloria (from Ecuador) attended this school, and it is where they met.

First Presbyterian Church has a long tradition of mission, both locally and farther from home. This experience in Costa Rica, working together with the people of Betania, was transforming for those of us who made the journey. As we share the stories we remember in our church history of 150 years, we can also be inspired to seek future opportunities in mission to continue "Living a Legacy of Love."





Syria-Turkey Earthquake



Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) urges your support in the aftermath of the 7.8- magnitude earthquake and its aftershocks in Syria and Turkey. 





About World Day of Prayer



Since the nineteenth century, Christian women in the United States and Canada have initiated cooperative activities in recognizing the critical role of prayer in mission work and their call to promote world peace through worldwide mission work. The first organized "day of prayer for the world" was held in Canada on January 9, 1920, the United States soon followed on February 20, 1920.

Now hundreds of thousands of women (and men, youth, and children) from around the world and in every region gather to collectively worship from around the world and in every region gather to collectively worship on the first Friday in March. Each year, a different county serves as the writer of the World Day of Prayer worship service and other materials. Women of that country's national WDP committee interpret scripture within their cultural context and prepare a worship service; women around the world lead the services.

This year, the women of the World Day of Prayer Committee of Taiwan call us to worship with the words "I have heard about your faith", inspired by Ephesians (1:15-19). We are invited to learn about Taiwan's history and culture. The women share their stories of intergenerational wisdom, traditions, and experiences of God's profound love.

The theme of the worship service "I Have Heard about Your Faith," based on the letter to the Ephesians, is an invitation to active listening, which is the ground of our prayers. Following the example of the letter (1:15-19), where the author praises the church for their faith in Jesus and love toward all the saints, the worship service contextualizes the witness of the saints with the stories from Taiwan.

The worship service shares the letters of encouragement sent to women who faced suffering and injustice. Their stories of faith contemplate issues that are shared by women and girls around the world and that continue to challenge us to prayerful action.
