100 Years of Boy Scouts at First Presbyterian Church, Hastings, Nebraska

The First Scouts at First Presbyterian Church in 1918:

The guns of World War I were still booming on the Western Front when Session member Edgerton moved, "...that we as a church take charge of Boy Scouts in the City of Hastings..." (Session minutes, Dec. 20, 1917). Dorothy Creigh (The First Hundred Years, p. 43) writes, "...the church took over the Boy Scout troop which had earlier been established by the Episcopal Church." It was known as Troop 4.

On January 9, 1936, in the midst of the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl, the session moved that the church change Troop 4 to a new charter - Boy Scout Troop 200. The new troop was very active and participated in weekend campouts, Camp Augustine programs, and even national Scout Jamborees. The troop established the enduring tradition of hiking, backpacking, and camping in Poudre Canyon, CO. Leaders expanded scouting to include Cub Scouts, Webelos, and Explorer Scouts.

The World War II Era (40's to 60's):

Equipment was often WWII surplus gear. Activities in Poudre Canyon included camping at Cameron Pass and backpacking up to Crown Point and over a high divide to Estes Park. Larry Nowka, a Cub Scout in 1950, states: "That is when scouts dug out the space under the Memorial Room with shovels and buckets and turned the new space into a scout room.

The Backpacking/Low Impact Era (60's to 80's):

Winter campouts were held at the Bohlke farm northeast of town and the Howard place south on the Little Blue. Scouts hiked, backpacked, and climbed extensively in Colorado. Mt. of the Holy Cross and La Plata Peak were favorite Fourteener climbs. Distance bicycling also became a popular activity for this group of scouts.

Every summer the troop drove north into the Sand Hills to canoe the Calamus, Dismal, Loup, and Niobrara rivers. The area ranchers came to know us and welcome us with cookies and cold drinks. 29 people canoed the Niobrara June 14, 1980, but we were challenged by high winds, rain, and hail which damaged vehicles and washed out access roads up and down the valley. Some suffered welts from the hail, but a rancher helped us and everyone worked together to get home safely.

The Modern Era (90's to Present):

Campouts took place at many nearby locations: Mormon Island, Fort Kearney, Prairie Lake, Halsey Forest, Hastings College Observatory, and Camp Augustine. High Adventure trips included Philmont Scout Ranch, Boundary Waters, and National Jamboree. Dr. Harvey Freetly was an active leader during this era and continues to work at the local and district levels. He is the person to contact if you have questions regarding present day scouting at the local and district levels.

Inclusion

From the beginning T200 has welcomed all boys and with the help of fundraising projects and private donations has made it possible for every scout to participate fully. January 1, 2014, after years of discussion, BSA National Council approved a resolution to remove a restriction denying membership to youth on the basis of sexual orientation. Troop 200, thankful for the encouragement and support of First Presbyterian Church, has always endeavored to include all interested boys.

God and Country Award

Sponsorship and encouragement by church and scout leaders and parents motivated many scouts to earn the God and Country Award.

A Few Examples of Troop Service Projects:

- -Planting NRD trees on area farms.
- -Pick up trash around Heartwell Lake.
- -Help install Oregon Trail markers in Adams County (e.g., 32 Mile Station).
- -Arbor Day tree planting.
- -Rake leaves for free will offering and donating proceeds to Healthy Beginnings.
- -Sold popcorn and soda at the pro wrestling programs at the City Auditorium. Profits were used to help scouts pay for the Camp Augustine week.
- -Working on a Habitat for Humanity house.

Eagle Service Projects (A few examples):

-Jeff Howard – Developed a training seminar on winter travel preparedness.

-Jon Jorgenson – Goodfellows food distribution.

- -Ken Locke Plant 50+ trees at Lake Hastings.
- -Rob Shoemaker Install storm drain markers that discourage dumping into storm drains.
- -Thomas Freetly Install tree identification posts and plaques on Hastings College campus.

-Mason Spilinek – Digitize photos of Juniata Cemetery grave stones.
