Eschewing idols and leaning into love

Dear First Presbyterian Church Family:

We are on the last week of our sermon and adult education series, "Building the Beloved Community in an Age of Polarization." We have spent the last month reflecting on the call to live faithfully amidst division, drawing lessons from the biblical stories we've explored in worship and in our adult ed classes and discussion groups. Our world, much like the biblical world, is rife with competing loyalties, fear, and unrest. Yet, Scripture offers us guidance on how to navigate this polarized landscape, calling us to resist idolatry and embrace the true freedom found in Christ—a freedom defined by love, service, and unity.

On Sunday, we addressed the danger of idolatry. In Exodus 32, the Israelites, fearing Moses' prolonged absence, crafted a golden calf to worship. Though it might seem like a distant and irrelevant story, the pull toward idolatry is just as real today. Instead of golden calves, our idols may take the form of wealth, power, and political allegiances. In our sermon on October 6th, we explored how political factions and personal grievances can become modern-day idols, pulling us away from God and dividing us from one another. These idols are exacerbated by cable news networks and social media, and they destroy the beloved community, tempting us to demonize those we disagree with rather than seeing the image of God in everyone.

We reflected that Paul's letter to the Galatians offers us another vision—one where freedom is not about pursuing individual desires but about love. As Paul writes in Galatians 5:13, "Do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another." True freedom is relational; it calls us to love and serve our neighbor, not retreat into self-serving autonomy. In a world that encourages division, we are called to a freedom that empowers us to resist the forces that seek to fracture our communities.

A week earlier, we reflected on what it means to be set apart as God's people. In Exodus, the Israelites are set apart by the blood of the lamb during the Passover, marking their homes as belonging to God. Yet, they are not called to escape the world but to live faithfully within it, trusting God's redemption. Similarly, 1 Peter calls us to be "living stones," building a spiritual house centered on Christ, the cornerstone. Our identity as Christians is rooted in our connection to one another and our shared purpose of proclaiming God's love. Our behavior of love and compassion towards all, even those we disagree with, should make us "set apart" as disciples of Jesus Christ in today's polarized and broken world.

This series has reminded us that building the beloved community requires intentionality and faith. We must reject the idols that divide us and live into the freedom that unites us in love. As we move forward together, may we continue to embrace our calling to be set apart, not in isolation, but as agents of God’s reconciling love in the world.

Our sermon and adult education series continues for one more week. We hope you will join us in worship on Sunday, October 13, as Rev. Bill Nottage-Tacey concludes the sermon series with a sermon entitled, “A People of Ultimate Hope Living in a Pen-ultimate World.” This sermon will reflect on the trial of Jesus in John 18 and The Barmen Declaration, a confessional statement in our Presbyterian Book of Confessions that was written

My hope and prayer is that the study and reflection we have done in the last month empowers us to go forth, guided by Christ’s love, committed to building a community where division gives way to unity, and where all are welcomed and valued as beloved children of God.

Exciting News: New restrooms off the sanctuary now open!

We are pleased to announce that the new restrooms off the sanctuary are now open for use. These are *family restrooms*, meaning they are single-seat restrooms with locking doors that can be used by anyone, just like the bathrooms in our houses. This design is the industry standard for new restrooms, for example you will see all of the public restrooms at the College View Retirement Community are this way.

These family restrooms provide added flexibility and convenience, especially for those assisting loved ones with dementia, mobility issues, or for parents helping young children. We hope these new facilities will enhance the sense of welcome at our church for our members and the community.

By September 8, the former women's restroom off the sanctuary will be converted into a "Wiggle Room" for families with small children that will also include one additional single seat family restroom with a locking door and a changing table.

We will also be updating the restrooms behind the fellowship hall with new flooring, tile, and fixtures. Those will continue to be a *Men's Room* and a *Women's Room*.









Presbyterian Women Hurricane Helene Relief Drive

Presbyterian Women will be in the Memorial Room on Sundays following worship, doing a drive to help with disaster relief from Hurricane Helene. The following items are being requested. Monetary donations will also be accepted to purchase the items to assemble the kits.

Cleanup Kits

- One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (If reused, please scrub clean. Do not use a bucket that has held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid. Advertisement on the outside acceptable.)
- One 4-8oz. pump spray air freshener
- Five scouring pads (No stainless steel or pads with soap in them. Remove from packaging.)
- Seven sponges, including one large
- One scrub brush (With or without handle.)
- 18 reusable, lightweight multipurpose dry cleaning towels (No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels. Remove from packaging.)
- One 32-64oz. or two 25oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-34oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- One 12-40oz. bottle of liquid concentrate household cleaner that can be mixed with water (No spray bottles.)
- One package of 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100ft. clothesline (Cotton or plastic line.)
- Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred; No surgical masks.)
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (Latex-free, non-surgical. Durable for multiple-use. Remove from packaging.)
- One pair of work gloves (Cotton with leather palm or all leather.)
- 20-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll (Remove from packaging.)
- One 6-9oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent (Pump spray bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes also acceptable.)

Value: \$75

All cleaning items must be new, and all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Please place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packaged securely to avoid damaged during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packaging tape. Please do not enclose cash or checks inside of the kits or the boxes.

Hygiene Kits

- One hand towel measuring approximately 15" x 28" to 16" x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
 - Must be sturdy with at least 6 inches of teeth
 - No pocket combs or picks
 - Rattail and combs without handles are acceptable
- One fingernail or toenail clipper removed from the package (either one is acceptable)
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package
- One toothbrush in the original package
- Ten standard size Band-Aids
- Wide-tooth Comb

Value: \$15

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon Ziploc type bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing.

Please Do NOT add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each hygiene kit just prior to its final journey.

CWS Period Pack

(Menstrual Hygiene Kit)

- One 1-gallon size re-sealable bag
- Two 2oz bottle hand sanitizer
- Three 4-gallon bathroom trash bags
- One travel pack of Wet Ones
- 5 regular Tampons
- 5 super absorbency Tampons
- 10 Pads (Unscented. Long super ultra-thin.)
- Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger. No Ivory or Jergen's soap. Do not remove from packaging.)
- One pack of flushable wipes (Unscented. 42 count)
- Six fragrance-free laundry sheets (placed in small, Ziploc bags)

Please place all items in the plastic bag, remove air, and seal. All items must be new.

Do not enclose personal notes, money, or extra items in the kits.
