CALL TO WORSHIP

This is a day of remembrance for us.

We call on the name of the Lord.

REFLECTION ON PASSOVER

SECOND READING

Luke 22:19-20

INVITATION TO THE LORD'S TABLE

GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you.

And also with you!

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them up to the Lord!

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Why do we give thanks and praise before this table?

We give thanks and praise for God's work of creation, liberation, and salvation.

It is right to give praise. It is our duty and delight! God created the heavens and the earth and all that is in them. God made us in God's image and in countless ways has shown us mercy.

God freed all of us from slavery and sin and claimed us as God's own people, making a covenant with us. God fed us with manna in the wilderness of our lives and leads us to a land flowing with milk and honey.

When we have forgotten God's covenant, God sent us prophets to remind us, and when the time was right, God came to the world to be with us and love us.

All glory and blessing belong to God, for God sent us Jesus, who humbled himself, becoming human. He even suffered death. His death opened up new life for us.

Gracious God, pour out your Holy Spirit upon us, and upon these gifts of bread and cup, that the bread we break and the cup we bless may be the communion of the body and blood of Christ.

By your Spirit, unite us with the living Christ and with all who seek to follow him, that we may be one in ministry in every place. As this bread is Christ's body for us, send us out to be the body of Christ in the world. As our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever. Amen.

Why do we eat this bread?

On the night before Jesus died, he took bread. After giving thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples saying, Take, eat. This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

(You are invited to serve one another the bread. As you pass the plate of bread to the person next to you, please say "This is the body of Christ, broken for you.")

Why do we drink from the cup at this table?

The same night, Jesus took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood for you, shed for the forgiveness of sins." Do this in remembrance of me.

(You are invited to serve one another the cup. As you pass the tray of cups to the person next to you, please say, "This is the blood of Christ, poured out for you.")

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

God of grace, we give you thanks for the feast of redemption we have shared in the body and blood of our Savior. As you have nourished us with love, let our lives proclaim your great love for the world. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Answer us in the day of trouble, O God, so that we may lift up the cup of salvation in the presence of your people, giving thanks for all your goodness to us; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.






All Who Hunger, Gather Gladly 509
