Dear Church Family,

At the beginning of worship this past Sunday I began by welcoming those gathered into the new year. I do truly hope that you are all doing well as the new year begins. And please know that if you are not, you have an entire church family that you can rely on for strength and support. We may not be able to fix everything for you but we can certainly make sure that you don't face it alone. May the new year treat us all kindly and bring us peace.

One thing that we can be sure the new year will bring to us is a new lectionary cycle. The lectionary cycle offers suggestions for scripture to be studied on Sunday mornings throughout the year and as we move into 2026, we also move into a prolonged study of the Gospel of John.

Among the four gospels found in the Bible, the Gospel of John stands out. Matthew, Mark, and Luke are often collectively referred to as the Synoptic Gospels. Word sleuths among us can already tell you that synoptic quite literally means “viewed together” and the term illustrates that these three (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) have a very similar viewpoint. While there is material and emphasis that is unique to each narrative, these three generally tell the same stories in the same sequence. They can (sometimes to their detriment and our confusion) be viewed together.

John really cannot be lumped in with the others. This is due to a variety of factors. For example, in the Gospel of John the miracles of Jesus are often referred to as signs and their main function is to draw people into belief in Jesus and recognition of his identity as God’s Messiah. Whereas, in the Synoptic tradition Jesus’ miracles do not reveal Jesus’ identity, but rather signify the nearness of the Kingdom of God. Really the entire Gospel places a heavy emphasis on the identity of Jesus. Look no further than the first chapter and you will find a completely different kind of birth narrative that contains no references to dates or time or places and instead focuses entirely on Jesus’ identity as the Word of God made flesh.

The use of artistic, poetic, and double-meaning language, like that found in the opening chapter, is another reason that John has such a distinct flavor. The narrative is filled with extended conversations between Jesus and others in which Jesus frequently uses symbolic imagery and language dripping with double meaning to convey his thoughts. These conversations often leave people confused or saying things that they themselves do not understand.

Another frequent motif in the Gospel, which adds to the focus on Jesus’ identity, is Jesus’ use of “I am” statements. Throughout the narrative Jesus will use this phrase to define

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
himself by way of objects from everyday life such as bread, light, a door, a good shepherd, and the true vine. In other moments Jesus will say that he is, more abstractly, the resurrection, the way, the truth, and the life. The Synoptic Gospels, by contrast, contain stories which reveal the nature of God's Kingdom. In those narratives Jesus will often use the phrase, "The Kingdom of God/Heaven is like" before telling an illustrative parable. In the Gospel of John Jesus reveals himself first and then, by extension, the nature of God's rule.

The Gospel of John is enigmatic, poetic, and full of cross meaning and double talk. It is a Gospel that is brimming with questions and which often draws a sharp contrast between those who believe and those who do not. Already within the Gospel we have heard Jesus ask Andrew and others "What are you looking for?" while inviting them to "Come and see" where he is staying. As we move into and through the new year, I am excited to be spending more time with this puzzling Gospel as we, together, come and see who Jesus is and what he is up to.

The primary purpose of Royal Family KIDS Camp is to give foster children ages 7-11 a week of positive memories and royal treatment in a Christian camp environment. Adult Camp Counselors give attention and encouragement to his/her "Big Camper" during their time at camp. In addition, each Camper is exposed to a variety of fun activities, designed for their success and to build self-esteem. For most of these children, it's the best week of the year—a special time when they can focus on having fun and enjoy being a kid.

Camp Directors, Staff and Counselors go through intensive training. This includes a study of the dynamics of child abuse and neglect, facilitated by recognized professionals in these fields. There is also an intensive screening process for Counselors and Staff. Two Children—and only two—are assigned to each Camp Counselor. In addition, there is generally a "back-up" Staff person for each Counselor, so the actual Staff-to-Camper ratio is often one to one.
